

The Three Steps of Bible Study

1. **Observation**: What Does the Scripture Say?

- a. Notice Details, words, sentences, structure, etc.
- b. Don't read anything *into* the text, simply understand what it says

2. **Interpretation**: What Does the Scripture Mean?

- a. Follow the 5 Steps in the Interpretive Journey (see Handout)
- b. Come up with a "Big Idea" from the passage

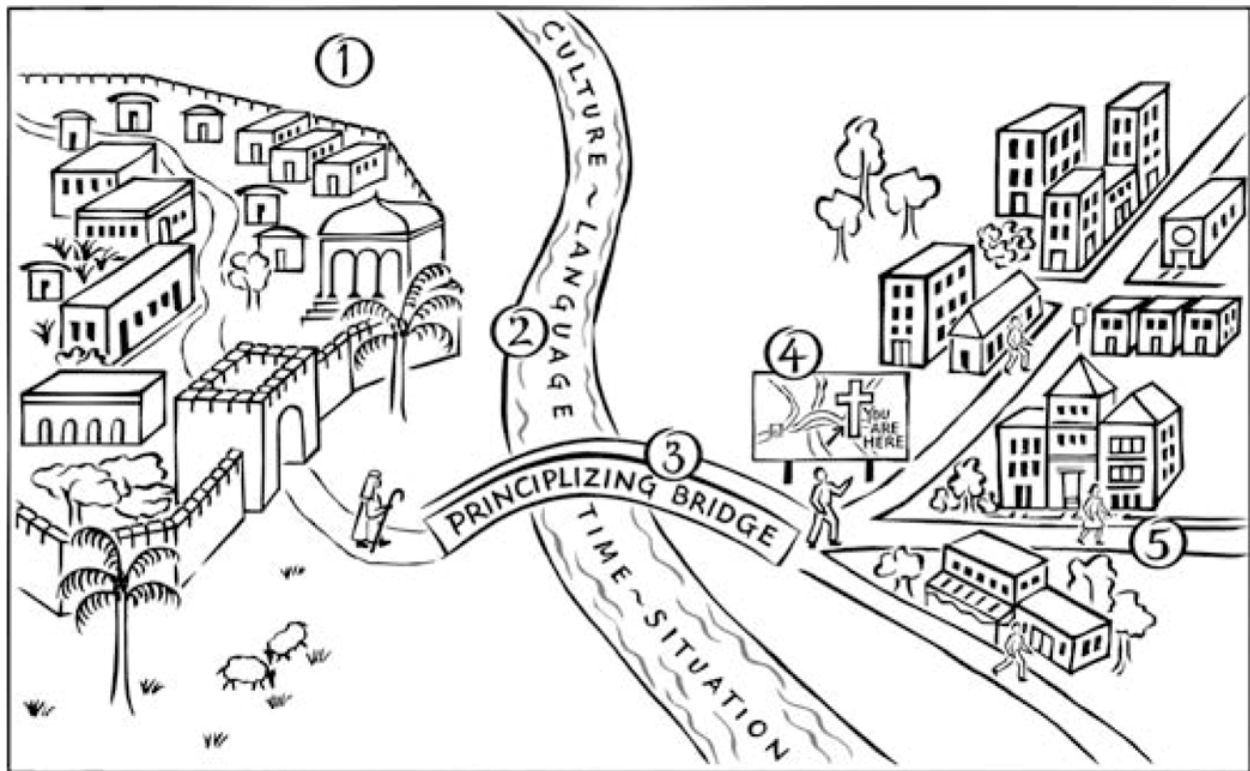
3. **Application**: How do I Respond to the Truth of the Scripture?

- a. Application is for the modern reader - either you or your audience
- b. Application should always be specific, not general

The Interpretive Journey



- Step 1: Grasp the text in their town. What did the text mean to the original audience?
- Step 2: Measure the width of the river to cross. What are the differences between the biblical audience and us?
- Step 3: Cross the principalizing bridge. What is the theological principle in this text?
- Step 4: Consult the biblical map. How does our theological principle fit with the rest of the Bible?
- Step 5: Grasp the text in our town. How should individual Christians today live out the theological principles?
